

**Sharon Anderson** was born and raised in Logan, Utah. After working at Weber Mental Health in the Drug and Alcohol unit for several years, she married. While Ms. Anderson was raising her two children, she stayed home and learned to design and sell log homes for over 15 years. She then took a job working with the elderly at St. Mark's Gardens for two years. During that time, she joined the Board of Directors at, what is now, the Family Connection Center. In 1995, she became the Executive Director. The Center has increased from one building in Clearfield to three locations. There is a crisis/respite nursery in both Clearfield and Bountiful, the largest food bank in the county in Layton, outreach/education programs in Clearfield and Bountiful, a therapy department, a transitional housing program, and many more programs making up a safety net for families in Davis County. Ms. Anderson has a Bachelor degree in Sociology from the University of Utah and a Masters Degree in Educational Psychology from Utah State University.

**Quincey Atkin, PhD** is the CTTN project coordinator at Primary Children's Center for Safe and Healthy Families and licensed psychologist in Utah. Dr. Atkin has prior experience in working with adolescents with a variety of mood, anxiety, behavior, and substance abuse problems in residential/outpatient settings, as well as with victims of abuse. She is trained in AF-CBT, and is receiving advanced clinical training in TF-CBT and PCIT, particularly with cultural adaptations for Native American populations. She is a member of the Training Core, led the formation of the American Indian Working Group for the NCTSN, and is a member of the Cultural Competence Consortium for NCCTS. Dr. Atkin lived on a reservation and is a registered member of the Blood Tribe.

**Larry Beall, PhD** has been a Psychologist for 18 years and has been clinical director of Trauma Awareness & Treatment Center (TATC) for 10 years. TATC has published treatment protocols and materials to assist practitioners in the treatment of trauma and to inform the community of trauma issues. Dr. Beall is a Member of the International Association of Traumatic Stress and Dissociation and serves as a State of Utah Critical Incident Stress Debriefing Team Member. He provides psychological assessment for the courts pertaining to trauma issues. Dr. Beall received his PhD from Brigham Young University.

**Michelle Benward** is Vice President of New Frontiers for Families and the Grant Coordinator for Southwest Mental Health. She served as the Primary Counselor at the Turnabout Ranch, Inc., an adolescent treatment facility. Michelle is most interested in work with youth with complex needs and believes that family involvement in development of service provision for youth is essential. Michelle received her Bachelor and Master Degree in Psychology from the University of Utah.

**Kevin Campbell** is EMQ Children and Family Services Vice President of Strategic Planning and Service Innovation. He has served children, families and older adults as a human service administrator and director for the past 20 years. Most recently Kevin has been a director with Catholic Community Services of Western Washington State, the creators of the original Homebuilders model, the nationally recognized FAST Teams and Family Finding practice. He is a Technical Assistance provider for the National Resource Center for Family Centered Practice and Permanency Planning at the Hunter College of Social Work in New York, New York, a program of the Children's Bureau ACF/DHHS. The NRC provides assistance to states, territories and tribes to improve child welfare practices. Kevin is also a Technical Assistance provider for the California Permanency for Youth Project working with four counties in California to strengthen permanency-planning practice for young people. He has administered small family based residential homes, treatment foster care networks, Wraparound services and FAST Teams across Washington State. Kevin is a widely known lecturer for Child Welfare Agencies, Children's Mental Health Organizations, Universities and National Conferences.

**Laurel Carter** has worked with individuals in families experiencing Domestic Violence for 10 years, including abusive partners, non-offending partners and children. She currently serves as Director of Family Institute and has served as clinical and research director of the DV treatment program for Family Institute. Served as committee chair for Utah Child Witness of DV treatment committee. Ms. Carter has a BS in Psychology and MS in Marriage and Family Therapy. **Kathie Castle** currently works with the Ogden Christmas Box House, where she provides therapeutic services for children and their families, and foster families – aiding in the transition process when the child is moved from the shelter back home or to a placement with kin or a foster family. She has worked as a counselor for the Utah Division of Youth Corrections, as a caseworker and a supervisor for the Utah Division of Child and Family Services and as a mental health therapist at Weber Human Services. She is a firm advocate for bilingual and cross-cultural work, she is a member of the Centro De La Familia Cultural Competency training team and works a great deal with the community to learn as well as teach how to provide effective services to Latino families. Upon his retirement he received the Governors "Distinguished Citizen Award". In 2003 he was awarded a Doctor of Laws (honoris causa) from Bellarmine University.

He is an expert in the area of attachment and has recently published articles in the Infant Mental Health Journal and the Juvenile and Family Court Journal on the application of attachment to clinical practice. Dr. Goldsmith and his colleague, Dr. David Oppenheim at the University of Haifa, are presently co-editing a book on the clinical application of attachment theory which will be published in early 2007. **Emily Hutchinson** is a Senior Staff Associate with Action for Child Protection and the National Resource Center for Child Protective Services. She is the past Director of the Centers for Specialized Child and Family Services of Seven Counties Services, a private, non-profit mental health agency in Louisville, Kentucky. She has 34 years of experience in Child Protective Services and high risk Child and Family Mental Health programs, having been an Investigative and On-going Worker, Supervisor and Manager in CPS and having developed and implemented multiple innovative and non traditional mental health services to address all forms of child maltreatment, domestic violence, substance abuse and acute and chronic child and family situations. Janice has served on local, state, and national organizational boards that promote equal access for all individuals to quality/excellence in education, employment, healthcare, and a better way of life in general. One of her most noted national positions was serving on the National Bilingual Educational Association (NABE) Board, where she held various positions, including that of President. Locally, Janice served on the Coalition of Minorities Advisory Committee. She chaired the committee for two terms. **Jerry Pope** currently supervises the programming office for the Draper site. He has been with the Department of Corrections since 1985 serving on the Special Operations Team as a K-9 Officer; supervising Maximum Security inmates including Death Row and Special Intensive management, female inmates and the mentally ill. He is a member of the Utah Correctional Association, and member and past president of the Utah State Prison Employees Association.

**Craig L. PoVey** is the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Prevention Program Manager for the State of Utah. He has worked in the adolescent treatment and prevention field since 1990. Prior to working at the state level, Craig was the prevention grant coordinator for Weber Human Services in Ogden, Utah. He also is President of PoVey Consulting, LLC, a corporation that provides education, support, and direction to families and communities working to prevent substance abuse and other problems.

**Eileen Quintana** (Navajo name: Little Warrior) was born February 27, 1958, in Bluff, Utah. Eileen Tinhorn Quintana is an enrolled member of the Navajo tribe. She is born into the Nearwater Clan, born for the Edgewater Clan. Her maternal grandparents are from the Leaf Clan, and her paternal grandparents are of The Towering House Clan. Early years were spent attending Boarding School in Dennehotso, Arizona, herding sheep with her siblings near Monument Valley. There she gained an appreciation for Navajo land, Navajo people and Navajo living. Later she attended public schools throughout the central Arizona region. She lived with three different families while on the L.D.S. Placement Program. After graduating from High School, she studied at Brigham Young University. In 1979 she married, and currently resides in Spanish Fork, Utah with her husband Richard, mother Nellie Tinhorn, her five children, and two grandchildren. She is actively involved with the Native American community. Coming from a traditional Navajo background, one of the greatest blessings in life has been being taught the old ways by her mother. She has a particular interest in native songs, dances, and crafts. She feels strongly about the preservation of these arts, "I left the reservation not able to speak a word of English; it was my traditional beliefs that have brought me full circle. I've done a lot, I've seen a lot and yet I go back to where I feel the most at home. I fear the loss of our language, our culture throughout Native country. Our songs, our dances and crafts are our link to language and culture." Because of these beliefs she spends much of her time teaching songs, dances and crafts to young Native people. Eileen has formed a Performing arts group for the Nebo School District. The group (consisting of pre school to high school students) performed at various venues during the 2002 Olympic Winter Games, the Netherlands, the Op'Rokadise Folk Festival, Alaska and the Yukon. Eileen is self-taught singer. She has collected music for many years and began singing Navajo songs as a young child.

**Dale Schipaanboord** is responsible for all Department of Corrections Programs, including Education, Substance Abuse, Sex Offender Treatment, Division of Institutional Operations and Adult Probation and Parole. He has a Bachelors degree in Behavioral Science from Westminster College and a Masters Degree in Social Work from the University of Utah.

**Anne Schmidt** has worked for the Christmas Box House for just over 3 years. Currently she licenses resource homes who take children into their own home that would normally have to stay at the Christmas Box House. Anne has a Master's Degree in Family and Human Development from Utah State University and a social service worker license. Anne became a certified Motherread/Fatheread instructor in the spring and is looking forward to implementing this program at the Christmas Box House and the Division of Youth Services.

**Marty Shannon, LCSW** works for Utah's Division of Child and Family Services as the Adoption Program Manager. She has been working actively in the arena of child welfare since 1983. Prior to working for state government, she worked in two private non-profit child welfare agencies, first as a therapist with birth families, foster families, and adoptive families and then as a director. She has been involved with many

boards and advisory boards, and presented at many conferences over the years. The adoption of children with special needs is a personal passion of Ms. Shannon, as she is herself an adoptive parent.
